# From the President 2017 - 2018

Welcome to the summer edition of the MASS in Motion newsletter. I look forward to serving as your 2017-2018 MASS president. Fulfilling the role of president requires the work of a great team. As I enter this new role on the executive, I take great comfort in knowing that we have fantastic staff and members who work tirelessly for this organization and when called upon, "step up to the plate" without hesitation.

The three focus areas of MASS – Indigenous Education, Mental Health and Wellbeing and Early Childhood - are areas that require our undivided

attention. It is incumbent upon us to ensure Manitoba schools infuse Indigenous perspectives into our curricula. We need to educate our youth on the vital role Indigenous people played in our history; and we must to go deeper than dream catchers and teepees. We need to guarantee Aboriginal ways of knowing and being are a part of our students' educational experiences. To do this requires including the voice of Indigenous people in all aspects of the system; increasing the presence of Indigenous languages, cultures, and histories in curricula; and providing leadership and informed practice.

Students' mental health and wellbeing are critical to their success as human beings, as was so powerfully demonstrated by the student group at the annual general meeting of the Manitoba School Boards Association, this March. One by one, the students stressed the importance of feeling a sense of belonging, the importance of being accepted for who they are, and the importance of the system focusing on more than just grades. More and more youth are demonstrating high levels of anxiety

and depression. The skills necessary for students to thrive in today's high-stress, changing and fast-paced world are what some would call the "soft skills." Research is showing that the important skills for school and life satisfaction are these so called soft skills. Our role as leaders is to ensure the "soft skills" hold an honourable place in our students' educational experience.

The first five years of a child's life are critical to the child's intellectual growth. As articulated in its Position Paper on Early Childhood Education and Care, MASS is committed to its vision of high quality, systemic early childhood education and programming that is equitable and accessible for all Manitoba children and their families. The report goes on to say, "Studies show that children who enter kindergarten with a higher skill set generally experience fewer grade repetitions, on-time graduation, lower dropout rates and higher post-secondary attendance than those that enter with vulnerabilities." We know this, yet high quality programming is not available for all children, especially for those that need it most. In its position paper, MASS is asking all stakeholders to become involved and move from knowing the benefits of early learning programs to providing high quality learning programs for all children

As your president, I wish to lead this organization with my head, my hands and my heart as it continues to move the Indigenous Education, Mental Health and Wellness and Early Childhood Education agendas forward. We have made great progress on these fronts and we still have work to do.

# MASS in Motion Together We are Stronger

#### Together we are stronger, and get more done!

My last two annual reports to members have basically consisted of the myriad of events and initiatives in which MASS has collaborated with our educational partners - learning, advocating and acting together to further the cause of a high quality and highly equitable public education system in Manitoba.

Almost nothing we do anymore is done in isolation - as partners with other educational and community organizations, we share high quality professional development offerings and jointly advocate for real progress in such critical areas as Indigenous education, mental health and wellbecoming, early childhood learning, poverty reduction and recognition and celebration of all forms of diversity in our community.

Looking ahead to the coming year, it seems that the spirit of collaboration is only getting stronger:

MASS, MSBA, MTS, MASBO and MAPC now meet regularly and formally to discuss common concerns and action. The result of these meetings has been joint advocacy by way of letters signed by all 5 major educational partners. These meetings also help avoid duplication in action and events and often lead to further and deeper collaboration on events that might otherwise have only applied to one partner group. Another reason for the regular meetings is to prepare for regular quarterly meetings this group has with the Minister of Education, where we can address common concerns with one voice.

MASS has chosen to make many of its professional development offerings more responsive to other groups and to try to avoid competition in an area where many new and worthwhile offerings are filling up the calendar - an example of this is the restructuring of what was traditionally a MASS November Conference for members only.

MASS is piloting an approach that hopes to preserve some of the intimacy of a MASS members only event, while reaching out to community partners in a new way. Although MASS is collaborating with DisruptEd to offer a February conference which will include any and all, we hope to preserve the members only element by offering a pre-conference day on January 31 - with members then being free to register for either DisruptEd or the ASCD session on February 1.

Our summer institute this year is another example of balancing the needs of members while reaching out to the community. Simon Breakspear will present his message to almost 200 educators in Winnipeg as a lead-up day to the MASS Summer Institute, which can accommodate a much smaller group of mostly MASS members.

MASS continues to meet regularly on an interorganizational committee of Indigenous education committees, with representation from all 5

educational partners and the Indigenous Inclusion Directorate - and this will continue in the coming year. We will build on our joint field trip to Sagkeeng First Nation and continue to explore a shared vision for reconciliation with the leadership of our Indigenous partners.

In the area of mental health, wellness and wellbeing, our ongoing partner-ship with Thomas Falkenberg and the research group at the University of Manitoba will move to the next level, as we meet with Rob Santos, our Assistant Deputy Minister of Education, to discuss how the concepts being developed could be operationalized in assessment and reporting in Manitoba. It is expected that MASS and its members will play a major role in this work in the coming years.

And another collaboration that will continue to bear fruit this year is our work with the Social Justice Coalition. Together with the SJC, our educational partners and the department, we are exploring the possibility of bringing Paul Chappell to Manitoba for two related events - an invitational evening in October and a two-day seminar in April - to deepen our learning in the area of Peace Literacy.

We truly have a unique opportunity in Manitoba to be stronger as an organization and to get more done for our students in many different areas - by embracing the spirit and will to collaborate that is shared widely by our education and community partners.



## MASS Book Club Selections 2017 - 2018

In *Embers*, this carefully curated selection of everyday reflections, *Richard Wagamese* finds lessons in both the mundane and sublime as he muses on the universe, drawing inspiration from working in the bush - sawing and cutting and stacking wood for winter as well as the smudge ceremony to bring him closer to the Creator. Embers is perhaps Richard Wagamese's most personal volume to date. Honest evocative and articulate, he explores the various manifestations of grief, joy, recovery, beauty, gratitude, physicality and spirituality – concepts many find hard to express. But for Wagamese, spirituality is multifaceted. Within these pages, readers will find hard-won and concrete wisdom on how to feel the joy in the everyday things. Wagamese does nots eek to be a teacher or guru, but these observations made along his own journey to become, as he says, "a spiritual bad-ass," make inspiring reading.



In *Indigenous Writes*, *Chelsea Vowel*, legal scholar, teacher, and intellectual, opens an important dialogue about these social beliefs associated with the relationship between Indigenous peoples and Canada. In 31 essays, Chelsea explores the Indigenous experience from the time of contact to the present, through five categories – Terminology of Relationships; Culture and Identity; Myth-Busting; State Violence; and Land, Learning, Law, and Treaties. She answers the questions that many people have on these topics to spark further conversations at home, in the classroom, and in the larger community.




In his new book, Counting What Counts: Reframing Education Outcomes, **Dr. Yong Zhao** challenges our current approach to student success measurement and proposes a new paradigm, one that is focused on personalized and authentic learning. Overemphasizing test scores as measures of achievement is potentially harmful to education. The contributors identify key traits such as mindset, motivation, social skills, creativity, and entrepreneurial spirit that students, teachers, and schools need to acknowledge and cultivate. Educators are asked to shift the evaluation paradigm to focus on a multiplicity of skills necessary for success in the 21st century.

In *The Principal Reader, Darrin Griffiths and Scott Lowrey* speak directly to aspiring, novice, and experienced school leaders. The book features 56 leadership narratives from practising school leaders from the United States and Canada on topics such as: leadership theories in practice; confronting the status quo; improving instruction; reconciliation through education; leading through adversity; the challenge of change; fostering collaborative learning cultures; and social justice.



In The Language of Flowers, Vanessa Diffenbaugh uses the Victorian language of flowers was to convey romantic expressions: honeysuckle for devotion, aster for patience, and red roses for love. But for Victoria Jones, it's been more useful in communicating grief, mistrust, and solitude. After a childhood spent in the foster-care system, she is unable to get close to anybody, and her only connection to the world is through flowers and their meanings. Now eighteen and emancipated from the system, Victoria has nowhere to go and sleeps in a public park, where she plants a small garden of her own.



Soon a local florist discovers her talents, and Victoria realizes that she has a gift for helping others through the flowers she chooses for them. But a mysterious vendor at the flower market inspires her to question what's been missing in her life. And when she's forced to confront a painful secret from her past, she must decide whether it's worth risking everything for a second chance at happiness.
